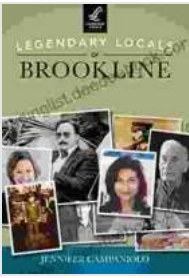


Legendary Locals of Brookline: Latricia Nelson Easley

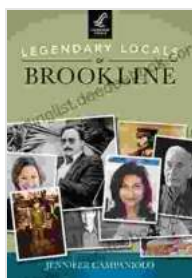
