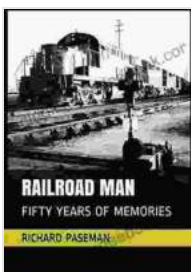


# Railroad Man: Fifty Years of Memories

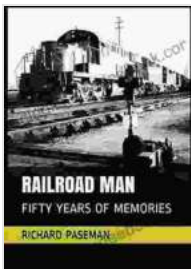
